



Write It Workshop Series: Brainstorm Bonanza

Workshop Objective:

The purpose of this workshop is to teach participants how to brainstorm story ideas effectively. By the end of the workshop, participants will have a list of ideas to draw from for future story writing.

Outline:

The instructor will demonstrate the importance of brainstorming and will share brainstorming techniques for writing stories. Participants will familiarize themselves with initial story development by becoming aware of the foundational components of stories (i.e., by connecting settings to characters and plots). Participants will leave the workshop with an understanding of the importance of story development, a list of story ideas they can draw from in future, and at least part of a written story.

Workshops are approximately 60 minutes in length, with the following structure:

- Ice Breaker activity (5 minutes)
- Minds-On Activity linked to the designated writing skill (15 minutes)
- Instructional component on how to brainstorm story ideas (10 minutes)
- Writing activity pertaining to the designated writing skill (25 minutes)
- Wrap-Up (5 minutes)

Ice Breaker Activity: *Book on the Brain* (5 mins)

Participants take turns to introduce themselves and, in one sentence, share the title of the book they are reading or read most recently and state one or two adjectives describing the book. For example, "I'm reading *The Giver* and it's interesting and spooky."

Minds-On Activity: *Stringing Story Plots* (10 - 15 mins)

A reproducible page with with 9 individual sentence strips will be provided with this kit to help with the activity, featuring three different settings, characters, and central actions/problems. The reproducible will also be available to download at www.ripplepublishing.ca/write-it-workshop-series.

- Sentence strips should be placed faced down in 3 piles – settings, characters, and central actions/problems.
- The instructor will model the activity by turning over 1 sentence strip from each pile, read it aloud and/or record the result on a chart for students to see. See chart below for sample results.

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- Participants are placed into small groups. The student with the first birthday of the calendar year is designated as the recorder. The student with the last birthday of the calendar year is designated as the reporter. Each group is given a set of sentence strips, paper, and a writing tool (pen, pencil).
- Participants in each group are given an opportunity to turn over one sentence strip from each pile and the recorder records results by creating a chart similar to that modelled by the instructor until time is up.
- Each group’s recorder shares two results aloud to the whole group.

Instructional Component: *Sentence Stretches* (15 mins.)

Instructor will model how each row of the previously created chart can be stretched to create a story idea using the chart below to model and record:

- Individual participants select a person or a character (i.e., A girl, Luke Skywalker) to develop into a *Sentence Stretch* as modelled by the instructor.

Writing Activity: *Write on!* (25 mins)

- Participants write a short story based on their *Sentence Stretch*.

Wrap-Up (5 mins)

- Participants volunteer to read their work aloud to the whole group or in their previously arranged group.
- Hand out Kids Write 4 Kids brochure.
